Last year was a year like no other. Our personal health was challenged, along with the health of our families and friends. Our vulnerable seniors' daily routines came to a screeching halt; they lost the ability to stay socially connected; they had little to no physical contact with family and friends; they experienced temporary cessation of work and volunteering opportunities, too. Parents encountered stress and strain trying to educate their children. The pandemic crystalized financial vulnerabilities of countless households.

When COVID-19 began to impact our community, United Way of Northern Ozaukee stepped up to assist with relief efforts, setting up a COVID Relief Fund. Goal: Invest in programs that support a healthier, more resilient community

193 children who witnessed or are recovering from domestic violence participated in supportive services to restore and maintain physical and mental health

5,972 support helpline calls offered hope and connection for people facing emotional challenges and mental-health concerns



EDUCATION

Goal: Provide educational opportunities to help people thrive at every stage of life

150 youth and young adults participated in safe, supportive tutoring and after-school programs

630 children received teletherapy counseling sessions to decrease negative reactions to stress



INCOME STABILITY

Goal: Empower people to get on stable financial ground

\$9,300 in gift cards was distributed to our partner agencies to help their clients buy food, gas and basic essentials during the holiday season

193 individuals facing temporary financial difficulty were given rent assistance keep them in their homes


SERVING OUR COMMUNITY TOGETHER

Ozaukee Family Services, a United Way partner agency, helps local senior citizens remain living independently. Usually, volunteers give rides to the grocery store, doctor's appointments and more, but during the pandemic, volunteers instead delivered groceries to OFS clients. Kristy, OFS senior services coordinator, also regularly called to chat with clients to see how they were doing. When she called Mary to check-in on her and see if she needed any groceries, Mary started to cry and

said, "You don't know what this means to me...it's like an angel just appeared on my shoulder." The OFS senior program and volunteers were a lifeline for many of our elderly neighbors who not only needed groceries, but also felt isolated, lonely and anxious.
